9/11 Remembrances

National September 11 Memorial and Museum, New York City



The world is dedicated to always remembering those who lost their lives in one of the most tragic events the United States endured. Tragic because so many lives were lost and so many others were affected. Tragic because it was a collaboration of attacks on the US from foreign identities that never had we experienced. We felt vulnerable and in disbelief. Fortunately, we are a combination of people who come together, helping each other in time of crisis. To help people heal, there have been many monuments erected in memory of those that lost their lives and the effect it had on each of us.

One of the most impressive memorials, this monument and museum is located on the former site of the World Trade Center. Soon after 9/11, this memorial was conceived to honor the thousands of lives lost on that dreadful day.

Over 5,201 submissions for the design from 63 countries came flooding in. The gentlemen who sent in "Reflecting Absence," were landscape architects Michael Arad and Peter Walker. There are two, 1-acre pools with the largest man-made waterfalls in the United States. These are the footprints of the Twin Towers, symbolizing the loss of life and the physical void left by the attacks. The fountains are intended to mute the noise of the city and provide a sanctuary for reflection. More than 400 swamp

white oak trees fill the Memorial Plaza, enhancing the site's reflective nature. The names of 2,983 victims are inscribed on 152 bronze parapets on the memorial pools. Ronaldo Vega, New York native and the Memorial's Director of Design and Construction, believes that human interaction with the memorial is vital for every visitor's experience. In his words, "We want people to be able to connect with the memorial. It is almost like a baptismal setting. Here folks can dip their hand in the water beneath the panel and leave a handprint instead of a stone or rock." The project uses recycled water for the waterfalls and irrigates the nearly 400 trees planted on the site.

From rubble to a tribute to all who lost their lives. The picture on the right was taken by photographer Tom Franklin on September 11, 2001. These three men were from different Brooklyn based departments. One grabbed a flag off a nearby yacht, they found a 20-foot pole from the debris and proceeded to erect it. Later his famous picture was made into "Heroes 2001" stamp.



National 9/11 Pentagon Memorial, Washington D.C.



The 184 lives lost in the attack of the Pentagon are represented by "Memorial Unit" benches. Each of these benches has a victims age and location at the time of the attack inscribed on it. The benches are arranged along an age line according to the year each victim was born. They are positioned to differentiate those who were aboard American Airlines Flight 77 and those who were in the Pentagon, and each contains a pool of water that reflects light in the evening. There are 85 Crape Myrtles surrounding these benches and the Age Wall, which grows one inch in height per year relative to the ages of the victims.

Flight 93 National Memorial, Shanksville, Pennsylvania



Forty-six minutes after Flight 93 departed Newark International Airport traveling toward San Francisco, a group of al-Qaeda terrorists hijacked the plane and made a U-turn toward Washington DC. Unbelievably, the flight crew and passengers fought back and because of this the target was thwarted. Sadly, forty brave people lost their lives and are memorialized here in Shansville. The Tower of Voices is a 93-foot-tall structure that holds 40 windchimes to represent those we lost. A wall of victims' names is listed and a hemlock grove, marking the exact site of impact lies on the grounds. This is along the 9/11 trail, a 184-mile hike-and bike path linking Washington, D.C. to New York City.

Reflect 9/11 Memorial Sculpture, Rosemead, California

Heath Satow, a Los Angeles-based sculptor built Reflect, a structure comprised of two hands. The large-scale metal structure is comprised of two hands lifting a single 10-foot, 500-pound steel I-beam pulled from the World Trade Center rubble. Satow welded together 3,000 four-and-a-half-inch stainless steel "bird-like" cutouts to form the hands, each piece representing one of the nearly 3,000 victims of the September 11 attacks.



First Responders Memorial, Oak Lawn, Illinois



The 9/11 First Responder Memorial is in Oak Lawn, Illinois. Erik Blome was the artist of this monument. He built the memorial using four twisted 22-foot I-beams pulled from the wreckage of the Twin Towers and escorted from New York City to Oak Lawn by a team of local firefighters and police officers. It contains intricate carvings of a police officer and two hands clasped together as well as a number of other motifs. It is meant to remind us of all the coming together, holding of hands that day.

Postcards, Staten Island, New York City

Masayuki Sono dedicated his work to those 274 residents of Staten Island who perished on 9/11. Inspired by the art of origami paper folding, the piece is comprised of two massive fiber glass structures that resemble folded postcards. Postcards points directly across the harbor toward the site of the former World Trade Center and features a series of 9-by-11-inch granite plaques carved into silhouettes, each honoring one of the Staten Island residents who died, plus the single Staten Islander who perished during the World Trade Center bombings on February 26, 1993.



To Struggle Against World Terrorism Sculpture, Bayonne, New Jersey



This is a massive sculpture that Moscow-based sculptor Zurab Tsereteli designed and was an official gift from the Russian government to the United States. Zurab watched on TV the horror the world was witnessing and was brought to tears, as many of us were. On his way to work he saw a mass of people crying around the American Embassy in Russia. This bronze piece of artwork is jaggedly split down the middle, revealing a single 40-foot nickel-plated teardrop, which was inspired by the sight of that day. This monument is often called "The Tear of Grief." Granite name plates, with names of victims, make the base of the monument.

Oh, When the "Saints" Go Marching...

Chateau Ste Michelle, Woodinville

It was announced in July that the Ste. Michelle Winery, the largest winery in the state, had been sold for \$1.2 billion to Sycamore Partners, a New York based private equity firm. Ste. Michelle wines are sold under labels including Ste. Michelle, 14 hands, Columbia Crest, Erath, Intrinsic, and Patz & Hall. It has been owned for the past 40 years by tobacco giant Altria, who owns cigarette brands like Marlboro. Wine sales have been declining over the past few years, with more people switching to craft beers and ciders. The pandemic shutdown of restaurants and cruise ships put a nail in the coffin, with Ste. Michelle reporting losses of \$360 million in 2020. The sale is not expected to bring any changes to the workforce, which employs about 800 people in Washington State. They plan to expand the marketing of their two largest brands, Ste. Michelle and 14 Hands. We hope they continue with the outdoor concerts at the Woodinville estate, which have become a favorite summer activity.

The Lodge at St. Edward, St Edward State Park, Kenmore

Boasting over 71 walking trails, St. Edward Park in Kenmore has long been a favorite place to get outdoors for a walk or a picnic lunch, but now the old monastery on the park grounds has been turned into an upscale destination hotel, restaurant, and spa operated by Columbia Hospitality. The new Lodge at St. Edward features 84 guestrooms, an upscale restaurant, several bars, a ballroom, and a fitness center. Chef James Wilson from The Lakehouse in Bellevue will oversee the Cedar and Elm Restaurant. One of the bars is called Father Mulligan's Heritage Bar after the priest who oversaw the construction of the original seminary.

BHS Alumni Wins Olympic Gold!

Zach LaVine, a BHS Alumni from the Class of 2013, won a gold medal at the Tokyo Olympics this past summer while competing as a member of the U.S. men's basketball team. The eight-year NBA veteran who plays for the Chicago Bulls, was a valuable sixth man on the Olympic team, averaging 9.7 points a game on 60 percent shooting from the field. He also contributed 3.3 assists a game.

As a Senior classman at Bothell, LaVine averaged 28.5 points a game, and was named the Washington State player of the year and 'Washington Mr. Basketball.' He also made *Parade Magazine's* All-America list. He led the Cougars to the state tournament in his senior year, but they did not take a place in the competition. After graduating, LaVine went on to play one year at UCLA before turning professional for the 2014-15 season. He was drafted by the Minnesota Timberwolves, where he played for three seasons before joining the Bulls.

Athletic ability runs in Zach's family. His father, Paul, played briefly for the Seahawks in 1987 and his mother, C.J., showed her athleticism in softball. Zach has been a spectacular dunker since his high school days and won the NBA slam-dunk contest in 2016 and 2017. As a 6'6" shooting guard for the Chicago Bulls last season, he averaged 27.4 points a game and was named to play in the NBA All-Star game.

LaVine is the only Bothell graduate to play in the NBA. The only major-league baseball player was Del Bates, Class of 1958, who played catcher in 1970 for the Philadelphia Phillies. The only two NFL players to be on regular-season rosters have been Bud Ericksen, Class of 1934, who played for the Washington Redskins in 1938-39, and Johnny Hekker, Class of 2008, currently a Los Angeles Rams punter.

LaVine is the second Bothell graduate to win an Olympic gold medal. Synchronized swimmer Tracie Ruiz, Class of 1981, won gold medals in solo and dual synchronized swimming at the 1984 Olympics. Her partner was Inglemoor graduate Candy Costie. Ruiz won a silver in solo at the Olympics in Seoul four years later. Ruiz' son is Michael Conforto, an all-star outfielder for the New York Mets. He graduated from Redmond High School in 2011.

Forever in Our Hearts - Officer Shoop

This time last year I had the honor, and the heartbreak, to write about the loss of one of Bothell's finest. On July 13, 2020, Officer Jonathan Shoop was killed after a routine traffic stop led to a chase and shooting. In October 2021, Officer Shoop's name was one of 295 officers added to the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial in Washington DC.

The National Law Enforcement Memorial and Museum is visited by almost a quarter of a million people annually. Dedicated on October 15, 1991, it honors local, state, and federal law enforcement officers who have died in service of their communities.

Designed by architect David Buckley, the grounds contain over 50,000 plants and 128 trees. In the spring, more than 10,000 daffodils bloom while visitors wander its three acres. Two, 304-foot-long, curving blue-gray marble walls list the 22,611 officers who've died in the line of duty since 1786. Bronze statues of an adult lion protecting its cubs, sculpted by Raymond Kaskey, are at each end to symbolize the strength, courage, and the protective role police officers accept when they take the oath to protect and serve.

Every year the site hosts a Police Weekend that include museum tours, a United by Light candlelight vigil, a Run for the Badge 5K, and a Roll Call of Heroes, attended by Honor Guards, to call out each officer added to the memorial that year.

Pop-up Shops Come to Bothell

What is a pop-up shop? A pop-up shop is a term given to a small shop or store that is deliberately temporary. They remain open for a limited time and are increasingly challenging traditional brick-and-mortar storefronts. Pop-up shops allow home-based businesses and entrepreneurs exposure beyond online venues like Etsy and Facebook and the flexibility of testing the market without the financial risk and commitment of setting up a permanent shop.

Partnering with a team from Mercy Corps Northwest, Bothell community volunteers chose four small businesses to open temporary shops on November 18th at the corner of Main Street and Bothell Way NE. Partially funded by a Port of Seattle Economic Development Partnership grant, the owners have access to resources like microfinancing, marketing, mentoring and education to improve business skills and generate revenue.

HappyBody Soaps, selling natural, handmade artisan soap and body products using essential oils and sustainable ingredients.

Bo'Bell Jewels, creating handcrafted and unique Boho Chick jewelry.

<u>Modest Family Solutions</u>, a year-round hydrophobic vegetable shop with an outreach program educating children on growing their own food.

The Painter, The Potter and the Puppeteer, featuring custom-made works of art.

The city council's goal was not just to bring additional customers to Bothell, but to support and provide additional opportunities to small businesses in our community.

Inspirational and Passionate Educator, Youth Advocate, Community Activist (31 years NSD staff)

Bud taught fourth and fifth grade at Arrowhead, Moorlands, and Shelton View elementaries before becoming the librarian/media specialist at Moorlands. He helped create and expand Camp Casey, the outdoor education program for fifth-graders, instilling a sense of wonder and responsibility in countless students over the years. Influential Teacher, Mentor and Presenter, Respected Educational Consultant (39 years NSD staff, IHS graduate, 1967)

He chaired the Professional Advisory Board at Seattle University for 26 years. Innovative Teacher, Principal & Superintendent, Tireless Advocate for Arts Education (BHS graduate, 1963)

Dennis served as teacher, principal, and superintendent of two school districts and superintendent of the Northwest Educational Service District, overseeing 35 school districts. He and his late wife established scholarships with the Scholarship Foundation of Northshore and the Stanwood and Winlock school districts for students wanting to become teachers.

This is the NSD Wall of Honor's eighth annual presentation of this scholarship. It recognizes students who have demonstrated a passion for making communities better places to live.

Michelle's interest in serving the community was most evident through not just the hours she'd spent, but her participation in ongoing service. She aspires to connect the world through the power of science and medicine, breaking down the barrier between society and those with mental illness. Her long-term goal is to help remove stigmas related to mental illness through educating the public about mental illness. While working as a research intern at the University of Hong Kong, she was inspired to see the world become a place where those with mental illness are embraced instead of feared.

Michelle achieved state recognition in Future Business Leaders of America, completed over two-hundred hours of volunteer work (from 9th-12th grade), and was granted the Volunteer Service Award from the National Honors Society. She was co-founder and website designer of the Child's Wish Foundation, published an article (Young Scientists Journal) on "Changing the Public's Perspective on Mental Illness," hosted virtual psychology summer camp for 32 middle school students, and participated as Future Business Leaders of America Junior representative and vice president. Michelle played first violin in orchestra and worked at the North Helpline Food Bank, as well as volunteering as translator and transcriber for TED Talks in English, Simplified Chinese, and Traditional Chinese.

Michell plans to attend Northwestern University to pursue interests in pre-medicine. She graduated from Bothell High School with a 3.94 grade point average.

Northshore Schools Foundation News

Submitted by Carmin Dalziel NSDF Executive Director Class of 1989

Our community's success depends on the success of our students. And today, supporting a student's success means supporting academic, social, and emotional needs, as well as basic needs for physical well-being. While the pandemic continues to impact our society, we are challenged to draw on our creativity, flexibility, and strategic thinking to respond in the most effective ways to the most urgent student hardship.

As we learn what's needed and what works, we adapt. Just a few examples:

- We updated 14 school libraries to better reflect the student body.
- Thirty-one schools received a total of \$12,400 to replenish the most sought-after titles in their libraries.
- Our bookmobile program delivered more than 20,000 books into the homes of children to keep!
- Contributions supplied 12 elementary school counselors with \$500 each to set up their new offices at 21 different schools.
- As the 20-21 school year began, we provided funding for books and the program trainer to support the Ethnic Studies program pilot.
- When in-person learning resumed in April, we provided 222 backpacks and 300 supply kits.
- This school year, \$86,011 was distributed to 333 families in need from the Foundation's Opportunity Fund and \$20,400 to 104 families in need from the Basic Needs Aid Fund.
- Thirteen NSD staff members received a total of \$6,622 from the Educator Crisis Fund.
- Thirty-one teachers working to achieve their National Board Teacher Certification received scholarships for support.
- Eighty-eight teachers received a total of \$11,950.00 in scholarships to take part in a new University of Washington leadership academy this fall and winter.

We don't do this work alone; we can't. In close collaboration with teachers, staff, and leadership of the Northshore School District, the Foundation works with parents, local businesses, Northshore Rotary, Bothell, Kenmore and Woodinville Chambers, and so many local partner groups to bolster our shared goals of championing student success.

Together, we will continue in our work: to focus on removing barriers to learning, building skills for student success after high school, and offering larger and more numerous classroom and district-wide grants.

Without volunteers, financial benefactors, and the talented board and committee members who lend their expertise, the Foundation's work is impossible. We're abundantly grateful to the thousands of people in this Northshore community who care so very deeply about public education, and whose passion fuels our endeavors.


