Yakima Fruit Market Takes a Stand and WINS!

We all know that location means everything to the success of a retail business, and the Yakima Fruit Market & Nursery has been well-situated in a prime location at the south entrance to Bothell for many years. The market is owned by BHS class of '74 alumni, Stuart and Karin (Bagnall) Poage, who took over the business from Stuart's parents. Both worked at the market since their teens, and hoped to keep the business in the family for many more years to come. However, their prime location along Bothell Way has made them subject to a couple of take-over efforts; first by the City, and more recently by Sound Transit. Sound Transit was talking about widening

Bothell Way by 25 feet in order to make way for a new rapid transit bus lane and sidewalks. That plan would have taken away the market's parking lot and perhaps part of their building too. Fortunately for the community and the owners, Sound Transit recently announced that their latest designs would not cause an impact to the market. Stuart and Karin had hired an attorney who specialized in "eminent domain" cases to represent them, and they were prepared to defend their property rights, so this news came as a huge relief, especially since they had just put a new roof on the building last year, and then were impacted by the Covid-19 shutdown. Any efforts to remodel the circa 1950's building and bring it up to today's code requirements would have been both difficult and costly.

Most residents probably don't know that the market location was originally occupied by a roadhouse called the "Blue Swallow Inn" that offered alcohol and entertainment during Prohibition. ("Blue" probably referred to the 1909 Blues Laws, which prohibited drinking on Sunday among other things.) When Prohibition ended in 1933, the owners used the roadhouse as their home. The husband, Ken Lynch, took a job driving a milk truck, which sometimes took him to Yakima. While he was there, he would buy fruit and bring it home for his wife Marie to sell on their front porch. Marie's "side business" must have been very successful, because in 1950 they tore down the house and built the market building that still stands at that location today. Times were different back then. Freezers were not commonplace, so many households bought crates of fruits and vegetables in the summer for canning. Peaches from Eastern Washington were a popular item to preserve for the winter months, as were cucumbers for pickling. A section on canning was still taught in Home Economics classes at Bothell High well into the 60's

For many years, Karin supported the Alumni Association by hosting a booth at the high school Homecoming games; and we at the Alumni Association join with the community in expressing our gratitude that the award-winning market will not be affected by the expansion of the rapid-transit bus routes along Bothell Way. There was a real out-pouring of support from the community that no doubt helped turn the tide with the decision-makers on the City Council and at Sound Transit. For many decades, the market has been a favorite spot for buying local and seasonal produce, and they are also popular in the fall for their pumpkins, and in the winter for their Christmas trees. The market is consistently voted "Best of Northshore" by the Bothell/Kenmore Reporter, and they are known for their Fourth of July float, which is also a frequent prize-winner. Their favorite award though, came as a complete surprise when the Seattle Times recognized them as 1991's "People of the Year in Puget Sound" for taking a stand against racism by posting a sign in front of their market that read "*Northshore Cares. We Reject Racism.*" If you haven't been to the market in a while, why not celebrate the holiday season by getting your Christmas tree there this year? They start selling trees right after Thanksgiving. *Happy Holidays!*

This certainly has been a memorable year. At least that's the word I am using to describe it. It is a year none of us will soon forget, nor should we. It certainly has been much more than a black-out mark in Marty McFly's DeLorean. On February 29, the Life Care Center, near Juanita Beach in Kirkland, experienced the first COVID-19 death in the United States. Bothell Sr. High was one of the first schools to close in the nation as a result of the pandemic. On May 25, George Floyd's murder sparked an explosion of civil unrest and public awareness throughout the country. Our region was significantly impacted by forest fires and frequency of intense hurricanes swept through the south. Summer activities, picnics, camping trips, parades, holidays, vacations, and family gatherings were cancelled in the interest of public health. There was a staggering loss of jobs and a political climate, of the likes I have never seen. I know this would all be hard to believe if we haven't been living it.

Merry smiled and replied, "It's a party that I can enjoy with my friends and family while I am still here; after all, we are all here only for a short time."

I had some anxiety as I debated attending the event, which lasted a couple of days, but I am so fortunate I did. In attendance were many former Bothell High School Alumni, friends, and family. There was not a single moment of sadness, but rather an entire time filled with fun, laughter, joy, love, and mask dancing; it was amazing. I suppose I am sharing this story because it is so important to look for the positive things in life and to enjoy the time we have. I also think it's important to ask ourselves during uncertain times, "What would Merry do?"

My wish for my fellow alumni is to be compassionate, be safe, and stay healthy as we all get through this time together.

In one newsletter, you had a very thorough review of the life and work of one of my all-time mentors, Bernie Ackerman. That man taught me so much! He was incredibly inspirational, exciting, and extremely talented. He helped to shape my life.

Remembering Coach



Coach Dee Hawkes

Bothell High School football coach and 2013 Wall of Honor recipient Myron Dwight Hawkes Jr., who always went by the nickname “Dee,” passed-away on September 24th from Parkinson’s disease. He was 84. Dee coached and taught at Bothell High from 1973-91. Courses he taught included psychology, biology, personal growth, and personal motivation. He also wrote five books including “What Every Coach Should Know” and “Football’s Best Offensive Playbook.” Hawkes attended several national football clinics and rubbed elbows with the likes of Bear Bryant, Woody Hayes, and Steve Spurrier. He was active in the National Football Foundation and American Coaches Association and for twelve years ran the Seattle Seahawk’s Coaching Academy. For 40 years, he wrote a column for a state coaching magazine that he called “Hawkes Squawks.”

Hawkes was born in Wallace, Idaho, but his family moved to Seattle when he was six. He was an alumnus of Queen Anne High School, where he was a three-sport athlete. He went on to play football for Washington State University (WSU). During his senior year at Queen Anne (1953-54), he played quarterback and led the team to the Seattle City Championship; played Olympia in the Turkey Day Game; and was selected to play in the City-State Game. One story he told about his years at WSU was about tackling University of Southern California (USC) star running-back “Jaguar” Jon Arnett who is in the National Football Foundation’s Hall of Fame. It was at WSU that Dee met the love of his life, Judy Greenup. They were married for 61 years and had two children, David, and Leanne.

Hawkes got his coaching start as an assistant at Port Angeles High School under Jack Elway, father of future NFL Hall of Fame quarterback John Elway. It was the senior Elway who gave Dee some coaching advice he never forgot. Hawkes, then only 22, had apparently been referring to the junior-varsity offense and defense as “my offense” and “my defense.” Elway pulled back the shower curtain, turned off the water, and told Hawkes to stop using the words “I” and “my.” Elway then turned the cold water on Hawkes and walked away. Maybe it was the cold water, but that lesson really sank-in.

When Elway left Port Angeles, Hawkes enrolled at the University of Washington to get his master’s degree, and while there he helped coach the Husky punters. After earning his degree, Dee coached the sons of military and civilian personnel in Japan and Germany. He returned to Washington and coached one year at Queen Anne High, before becoming the head coach at Davis High in Yakima for six years. It was after that, that he started coaching and teaching at Bothell High. In his 18 seasons coaching football at Bothell, Hawkes maintained a 76-91 record, before retiring due to health concerns. When a new high school in the Issaquah District needed a coach for its inaugural football seasonal, Dee came out of retirement to start the program at Skyline High School on the Sammamish Plateau. Not one to shrink from a challenge, he coached their first season without any seniors or even a locker room. His lifetime in-state record was 104-126-2. He was a wonderful coach and educator who contributed much to his sport, his players and students, and his community. He will be missed.

Bothell Grieves Its Fallen Hero

On July 13, 2020, Officer Jonathan Shoop, age 32, died in the line of duty after a routine traffic stop led to a short vehicle chase and shooting. Officer Shoop attended Ballard High School, North Seattle Community College, and graduated with a BA in History from the University of Washington. He served six years in U.S. Coast Guard as a Marine Science Technician, and was part of the response team to the Deepwater Horizon oil spill in 2010. Following a personal call to service, Officer Shoop was hired by the Bothell Police Department on June 3, 2019 and graduated from the Washington State Criminal Justice Training Academy on January 28, 2020.

A police cruiser was parked in front of Bothell City Hall after the tragedy, where hundreds of mourners brought flowers and signs to honor his service and show support for the men and women who protect and serve our community. Officer Shoop's memorial service was a private event, held on August 4, 2020 with police and fire departments from around the region participating in the procession through Bothell. Bothell residents paid their respects by lining the streets to view the procession as it passed. Officer Shoop is the first police officer killed in the line of duty in the history of the Bothell Police Department and will be deeply missed. He is survived by his mother, two brothers, and his beloved girlfriend.

Main Street Closed for Socially Distanced Dining

With so much uncertainty due to the pandemic, it's comforting to see how our town comes together to support each other when we need it most. Too many businesses have been forced to close their doors this year, but with the support of the Bothell City Council, our community has found a way to save jobs, support local businesses, and give residents a safe way to stay connected.

In the June city council meeting, City Manager Jennifer Phillips proposed to the council the idea to close Main Street to vehicle traffic between 101st Ave NE and 102nd Ave NE, and 101st Ave NE between Main Street and SR22, so local busi-

ness could offer outdoor dining and retail sales to customers. The proposal was unanimously supported and, effective June 15th, Main Street businesses set up to serve the community outside. In a subsequent meeting, businesses off Main Street were given the opportunity to use private property and their own parking lot spaces to keep doors open and aid in following social distancing requirements as well.

The response was an overwhelming success. Restaurants quickly put together procedures for safe take-out, pick up, and seating options for customers. People uncomfortable eating inside restaurants, now found picnic tables, Adirondack chairs, and shade umbrellas allowing them to enjoy meals outside in the sunshine. Soon residents were walking and biking down Main Street again. Children broke out sidewalk chalk and family dogs joined in on the fun. As word spread, people from neighboring towns began to visit Bothell once again.

The original plan called for traffic to resume after Labor Day but, as the virus continued to be a threat and the governor's Stay Safe protocols were unable to be lifted, the date was moved to October 25th. Once again, our City Council members responded to our community's request to continue with the closure until businesses can start serving inside. During the October 6th meeting, members voted to keep Main Street closed until businesses can open more indoor seating, or until the Bothell UW and Cascadia campuses reopen, requiring the streets to open due to increased traffic. Business owners will be responsible for keeping areas clear of leaves and snow throughout the season, but they can now order shelters and heaters to keep patrons warm and dry.

Through the continued support of our leaders and caring residents who look out for each other, our community will overcome anything that comes our way. Stay strong Bothell, we've got this!

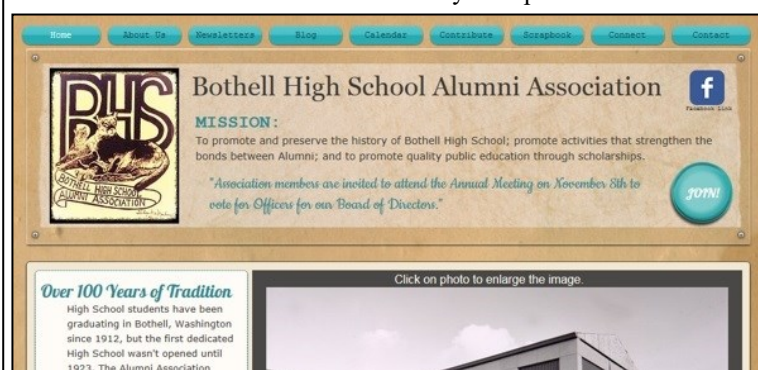

Tech Talk – The Alumni Association Gets a New Website

When I renewed my Alumni Association membership back in 2013, the Association President said in a newsletter article that the Association was looking for someone to help build a website, so I volunteered. I had just built my first website for my brother's business on a platform called "GO DADDY," so while I was a novice, I had some idea of what was required to publish a website. There were many website-building tools available at that time, but they all had different capabilities, so it was important to ask the board what they wanted the website to "be able to do" for them. This helped me zero in on a "security capability" that could differentiate one website-building tool from another. The most important thing to the Association was to be able to have a secure webpage for posting the four most recent newsletters, so that they would only be accessible to the members. The 'Go-Daddy' application I was familiar with did not have that capability, so that sent me on a search for another application. I was lucky to find an application called WIX, which had the "secure page" capability as well as many other helpful features.

Once the website application was chosen, the next step was to decide on the design, or "look and feel" that would best represent the Alumni Association. WIX offers many "templates" that have already been designed, so the user is mostly just in-putting their

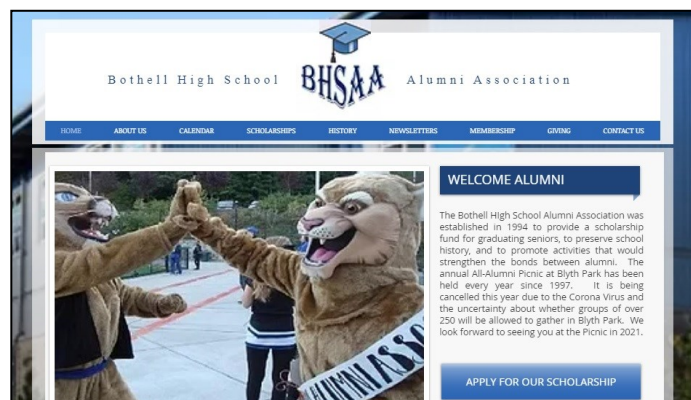


own data into the pre-set boxes. The original version of the website was built using a template that was designed for sororities. It had a cute scrapbook look and feel, and it also emulated a school bulletin board. Because the mission of the Association is to preserve school history, I selected a page 'background' that looked like an old brown paper lunch sack, and I modified the color of the Association logo to make it look like a retro Pee Chee folder. It was fun trying to find ways to use all the various gadgets available on WIX such as thumbtacks, paper clips, buttons, tape, frames, and sticky notes, but it turned out that all of those items tended to clutter up the page when the website was viewed on a Smartphone. As the use of smartphones have become more prevalent, it was clear to the board that

there was a need to renovate the website and gear it more towards viewing from a smartphone.

I began to work on a new website in June of this year, and the finished product was released on July 12th. The new website places an emphasis on the volunteers who keep the Association running, and on the mission of the Association, which is to grant scholarships to deserving Bothell High seniors; to preserve school history; and to foster a network between alumni.

The new 'background' for each page is a photo of the remodeled high school building, and the page colors are now the school colors of blue and white. The photo gallery on the home page features pictures from the All-Alumni Picnic, which has been the Association's annual event for many years. I am happy with how the new website turned out, and I hope it will serve the Association well for many years to come.

Then there was the State Championship. We lost 53-51 to Bethel. I missed my cousin's wedding that night. She had graduated from Bethel. But basketball had to take center stage. I was a team manager. My place was to be at the game, not at a wedding.


It was a long bus ride back to the BHS gym after the heart-breaking loss. I wondered what the ride would be like back to my home in Maywood Hills with Larry driving, and me trying to figure out what to say, or should I say anything? In the ride home, Larry brought everything back down to earth. It had been a tough loss, but life goes on. It was a lesson about resiliency and staying in the game of life.

Years later, whenever anyone would ask me, "Who was the mentor who had the most influence on shaping your life?" my answer was so easy; it was always Larry Peterson, a teacher and basketball coach at the high school I attended. Those rides back home after practices and after games forever shaped my life and helped to mold my character. Larry Peterson was the ultimate mentor.



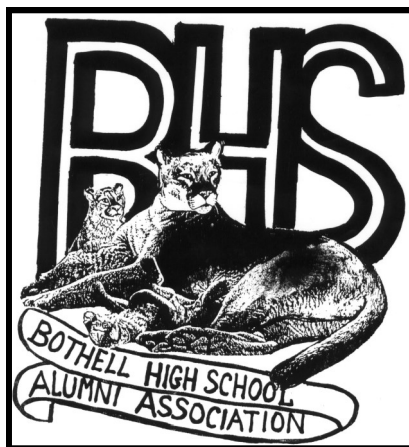
