# Last Founding BHSAA Member Passes the Torch

Much to our dismay, at the end of 2023, Bev Niemeyer Schmer, class of 1967, and the last founding member of the Bothell High School Alumni Association, will be stepping down from BHSAA and entrusting new members and volunteers to carry on what she started more than thirty years ago.

On November 18, 1993, the very first meeting of what would later become the Bothell High School Alumni Association was called to order by Bev. There were fifteen alumni in attendance with graduates from the class of 1931 to the class of 1989. Bev's agenda was specific: 1) Find – creating a central listing of the alumni, 2) Resource – of information on previous reunions, and 3) Homecoming – help plan and participate in the alumni portion. We still have a copy of those minutes, and the ideas envisioned the association would be:

- Membership fee will include a newsletter and booklet
- Scholarship fund
- Possible this could be a branch of Bothell High Booster Club
- Help unite the community

Thanks to Bev and her volunteers, many of those original ideas are still in place today. You're reading the second issue of twenty -nine years of the BHSAA newsletter. The BHSAA continues to award two scholarships each year to deserving seniors. We've worked closely with the Booster Club and strive to keep alumni informed of what's happening in the community, keeping their ties to Bothell strong, no matter where our graduates now live.

Bev has been our president, membership secretary, and chaired the Scholarship Committee. She's written countless articles for the newsletter, organized the annual all-alumni picnic, tracks deceased alumni, In Memory of donations, upcoming reunions, and manages the alumni business directory. She is also almost solely responsible for recruiting the board members and officers we now have. Whenever we need anything, Bev knows who to contact! There is so much more that Bev does; I could fill the entire issue and still not capture everything.

Bev is a life-long Bothell resident and historian. She and her husband Bill, BHS class of 1963, have three children, Becky, Matt, and Adam, and eight grandchildren, Wes, Dylan, Madison, Ashley, Aaron, Amanda, Juliana, and Kolbi.

Bev retired from the Northshore School district after 25 years as a bus driver, specializing in special needs individuals. She spearheaded Northshore's participation in the School Bus Driver Safety Competition's Roadeo, an annual competition emphasizing school bus safety and careful driving. In 2017, Bev was inducted into the Northshore Wall of Honor. Bev stays involved with family and can typically be found attending school and sports events. She helped raise her special needs grandson and is a strong, supportive, and loving role model to everyone.

### Bothell Civil War Veterans Honored

This story really begins with a man named Richard Heisler, who had and does have a passion to honor men and women of the civil war. He has a website –Seattle Civil War and recently he was honored by being one of Eric's Heros on KOMO4 News-Eric's Heroes: Honoring Civil War veterans through a touching cemetery tribute.

It was at this tribute that two men from Bothell were honored. It was a dedication of headstones for Robert Campbell and John Rhea. Robert's headstone was desecrated by vandals in the 70's. John did not have a headstone. His grave was unmarked and for years was covered with thick brush on the outskirts of the cemetery. Richard made it his mission to get new headstones for each veteran. He was able to contact family members of Robert Campbell but not of John Rhea. With the direction of Richard, the Campbell family produced all the necessary papers and Richard.


ard got papers for John and sent them to the VA. Both men received headstones. The City of Bothell helped put these markers in and helped with the Community celebration. This celebration took place on August 13, 2023, at the Bothell Pioneer Cemetery, 10816 Valley View Rd. in Bothell. The Bothell Historical Museum members worked with Richard on the event and supplied attendees with an event badge ribbon.

Descendants of Oliver Campbell, Mima Hannan and Irene Rosford were in attendance with their families and friends. John Roth spoke

about how while in Iraq a picture of his great-great-great-great grandfather Robert Campbell hung in his small barrack's and when he looked at it each night it was his inspiration to get through one more day of the war. During the event, volunteer veterans performed a ceremony and taps were played.

This celebration is only part of the story. You see, many civil war veterans came to Washington from all over. The unique part is that of the twenty in the Bothell Cemetery, eight came with family and friends from the same area, which was very strong in anti-slavery, and most were Republicans. These happen to have been our founding fathers of Bothell, those the town was named after. The story goes, when they were setting up an official post office in Gerhard Ericksen's store, they needed a town name. Mr. Ericksen said there were so many Bothells, let's call it Bothell. David and his wife Mary Ann Felmley Bothell were called Grandma and Grandpa by the whole town. Often it is thought it was named after David because he platted the town in 1890.

The other seven, from Indiana County PA, were John Bothell (son of David and Mary Ann), George Bothell (son of David and Mary Ann), John Keener (raised by David and Mary Ann)

after his parents died and he later married their daughter, Rachel), John Felmley (brother to Mary Ann Bothell), Andrew Wissinger, William Johnston, Robert Campbell (who married Mary Ann, daughter of David and Mary Ann Bothell).

Other civil war vets in the cemetery are Reuben Chase, Matthew Webster, Daniel Dygert, Alfred Crumly, Norman Ellis, John Carlton, Levi Bird, Porter Langdon, William Steele, John Rhea, Perry Vincent, and Charles Hilton. They came from many different states and counties.

A few interesting stories below were of John and George, but many more of the eight men from PA can be found if you go to YouTube, Civil War Bothell, and find the video dated November 17, 1922-Bothell and the Civil War.

John Keener was shot three times and left for dead. A bullet remained in his leg throughout his life. A black man came along and, skirting the enemy all around, hid him in his home where he nursed him back to health so he could return to his regiment. George Bothell was captured in the same battle as John Keener. He survived the horrors of Andersonville prison but was left with scurvy. He lived the remainder of his life without most of his teeth, bad digestion, pain, and arthritis. He was one of the first

to come to Bothell in 1865. He was totally committed to community service. He was a Washington State legislator and the first mayor of Bothell. He was also instrumental in starting the Bothell Methodist Church.

David Bothell, the founder of Bothell, went into the service at forty-five years old, and came home with a spinal injury.

In 1866, the eight and their extended families started a move westward. Alexander Campbell, Robert's father, and his extended family moved to Clayton Iowa and the rest moved to Calhoun County Illinois before coming to Bothell. They were looking for more land to farm than they had in PA. George, because of his afflictions from the war, kept moving to find what he could do for a living that did not require physical activity. There were strong advertisements for people to come West, so he came to the Seattle area in 1880. He managed logging companies and was a foreman on different jobs, he even worked digging the ship canal. He found a home in Bothell, and he urged the other seven to follow, which they did between 1885-1888.

The two women in back are Mima Hannan and Rose Etta Houghton. Rose became national president for the Women's Relief Corp, an auxiliary to the Grand Army of the Republic. Next is Irene Luella Rosford and Oliver Campbell. In the middle row, there is George, Mary Jane (Jennie) Oliver, Robert, his wife Mary Ann Bothell Campbell, and Belva (who may have been Mary Jane's first born and died at one year old). The little girl in front is Pearl Ball. The couple had one more child, Elizabeth, who died in her teens in Iowa.

John Rhea came to the area to be near family and died in Bothell, so he was buried here. Although he was not a founding father, many of his descendants did become community icons and one family member was a Walters, of Walters Feed and Mill.

Robert Campbell was my great-great grandfather, and it is with great pride that I write this story. I hope you will connect to the links to enjoy more history of Bothell and its founding fathers.

# Ancestry Travel - Finding Your Roots

For some people whose ancestors emigrated to America in the 19<sup>th</sup> or 20<sup>th</sup> century, finding the country of their origin may be relatively easy because that information can be found in the U.S. census, but for those of us whose ancestors came to America before the census, it can be more difficult. The availability of DNA testing through companies like Ancestry.com has helped, along with the use of their online "tree-building" tools. If you are a member of Ancestry.com, and do a DNA search through them, they will provide you with the names of other members who share your DNA. Otherwise, finding information about your ancestors can be a time-consuming process.

I began researching my family history in 1996, taking up the work that was started by my mother. She spent many hours doing research on her genealogy using the microfiche at the National Archives on Sandpoint Way in Seattle, while I did most of my early research at the University of Washington Library, where I had worked as an undergrad. I was lucky that the lives of some of my father's English ancestors were well-documented in periodicals such as the "Virginia Magazine of History and Biography," so a lot of the research had already been done for me; I just had to access it. The issues of the Virginia magazine that I needed weren't available at the library, so while on a trip to Washington D.C. for a wedding, I took a side-trip to Richmond to visit the Historical Society Museum. Once there, I was able to purchase three volumes of the magazine from 1920 that detailed the complete genealogy of my ancestors from the Lovelace family - a goldmine of information.

After that, life got busy, so it was another eight years before I decided to visit England to locate the homes of my ancestors. By that time, I had internet access, so I could research the website for 'British Listed Buildings' in the towns where I knew my ancestors had lived. By doing that, I was able to locate six buildings to visit — two were occupied homes, one was a hotel, two were churches, and one was a monastery in Canterbury. Because I was uncomfortable setting off to Europe on my own, I decided to sign up for an eight-day guided tour of London with the Rick Steves travel company out of Edmonds.

I thought taking a tour would help acclimate me to the ways of the country and give me more confidence with using public transportation. The London tour was phenomenal, covering all the major historical sites such as the Tower of London, the Churchill War Rooms, Windsor Castle, the British Museum, Westminster Abbey, the National Gallery, and the British Library. We walked or used public transportation to

get around, so by the end of the tour, I felt very comfortable taking the rest of my journey on my own

Following the tour, I took a train from the London St. Pancras station south to a town called Ashford where I had reserved a room at the Ashford International Hotel. One thing to know about the Rick Steves tour company is that they usually stay in small family-owned quirky hotels, while I prefer a modern hotel with lots of amenities, especially a good restaurant. The Ashford hotel had all that, as well as a large grocery store nearby, so it made for a good home base.

From Ashford, I took a cab to see the house where my Lovelace ancestors lived in a nearby town called Bethersden, and I also visited the church where the family has a Chapel in their name. The brick house (see photo) was built in the Georgian style sometime in the late 16<sup>th</sup> century and is still occupied today. While I couldn't go inside the house, I later

I took five more of Rick Steves' European tours after that, each time staying a week after the tour to visit another location where my Lovelace ancestors had lived. In 2015, I took back-to-back tours of Paris and Rome, and then visited Canterbury where I stayed in the Grey Friars Hotel that was once the home of my 10<sup>th</sup> great-grandfather. In 2016, I took the Rick Steves Villages of Southern England tour, and after that tour I visited a town called Walkern, where my 8<sup>th</sup> great-grandmother and her husband lived from 1632 to 1642.

found it listed for sale online, so I was able to see inside the house that way.

My last trip was in 2019 for an 11-day tour of France that covered Paris, the Loire Valley, Mont St. Michel (photo), the D-Day Beaches, and Monet's gardens at Giverny. Following that tour, I took a high-speed train North to Amsterdam where I stayed for a few days, and then I took two trains and a bus to get to Lichtenvoorde, a small Dutch town on the Eastern side of the country. Using that town as my base, I was able to take a bus each day to a battle reenactment in the nearby town called Groenlo. The re-enactment is of a 1627 battle where my 9<sup>th</sup> great-grandfather, Sir William Lovelace, was killed. Every two years, the whole town takes part in celebrating the battle that freed the town from their Spanish captors. The re-enactments were started in 2005 as a fund-raiser to replace the stained-glass windows in the church, and now 1500 re-enactors from around the world take part in the battle, including participants from England who represent my ancestor's regiment. During the event, the whole town shuts down and everyone dresses in traditional clothing, wooden shoes, and all. I found the Dutch people to be extremely friendly and most speak English, which always helps. I feel very fortunate to have been able to see so many important historical places, while at the same time learn-




The Knights preparing to go into the battle.

ing more about how and where my English ancestors lived before coming to America in 1652.

# BHS Alumnus Publishes His Second Book

Mace Brady's writing started with sending out BHS '65 newsletters to his classmates, which shared school memories, hobbies, and accomplishments. Whether it be about golf gatherings, skiing, and snow mobile events, traveling the world by boat, renting Stonehenge for a photoshoot, providing dental work for street kids in Bolivia, or memories of past coaches, teachers, and students, classmates were encouraged to share their stories for the "Cougar Chronicle." It was fun encouraging them to share what they'd been doing and their interests and accomplishments.

Mace furthered his interest and skill in writing while teaching in Washington state's public schools as well as the 6th US Army Area Intelligence School. He is twice retired after 32 years teaching and 30 years in the army reserves. Mace and his wife reside in Woodinville.

While teaching writing and history at the secondary level, he developed a strong desire to personalize history and bring it to life.

After serving in the US Army, Brady published his first book, Supreme Truth (found on Amazon.com) that was based on real events—terrorist

attacks in Japan. Throughout his military career, Colonel Brady held multiple positions, such as battalion commandant of US Army Reserve Forces schools and Washington state's emergency preparedness liaison officer.

His current book, Caught in the Rush, launched August 8, 2023, shows the events that his grandfather encountered while prospecting in the north. Using his grandfather's diary, one of the most prominently quoted diaries of the Klondike goldrush, Brady tells a story that helps the reader grasp the prospector's adventure and includes the events along the way.

Mace is a Bothell High School, class of 1965, and Eastern Washington State graduate, with a master's degree from Seattle University. He was also one of ten Army Reserve officers who were selected to attend the US Army War College (class of 1994). He taught on Mercer Island for 32 years as well as for the 6th US Army Area Intelligence School—in the summer months. His latest book (historical fiction) is available at Barnes and Noble, Target, and Amazon.com.

The Bothell Library has long played an important role in the community thanks to the dedication of the volunteers who have helped raise funds to support library programs throughout the years. The funds they have raised through book sales go to support the library staff, as well as programs for adults, teens, and children; and for some special projects for the King County Library System (KCLS).

The first Bothell Library Board held a book sale in 1963 to raise funds to build a new, stand-alone library building. Since 1967, the Friends of the Bothell Library have held at least two book sales a year. The book sales were held in the meeting rooms of the Dawson Street Library for 26 years. When the new building was built in 1995, the bi-annual sales continued and have been there for the last 24 years. The first time the Board did not hold book sales was when the Covid-19 pandemic closed everything down. They also always have a book cart or shelves where the public can buy used books year-round to support the library. Now that the library is open again, the shelf space for the used books has expanded and a crew of six volunteers sort donated books and fill the shelves daily.

As a volunteer at the Bothell Library since 1967, I have served as president of the Library Friends Board for over 20 years. I was also chairman of the KCLS Used Book Sales from 1992 to 2002, that were held every October in the Kamiakin Junior High double gymnasium. My daughter Laurie Green Edwards, who is treasurer of the Bothell High Alumni Association, has been involved with library book sales since she was big enough to move a book. She helped with book sales throughout the years starting at the building on Dawson, was co-treasurer, and has now been treasurer for over 20 years. During the KCLS Used Book Sales, Laurie became my CFO and helped me run eleven successful annual sales benefiting Bothell Library and the whole of KCLS.

Another driving force in the library system was Bill Ptacek. Bill came to the King County Library System as Director in 1988. Bill spent the next 25 years revamping the King County Library. Under his stewardship, it became one of the first libraries in the United States to provide internet access and, in 2010, was the busiest library system in the country. He changed libraries from quiet places into buzzing community hubs. We became friends with Bill during the KCLS Used Book Sales and worked together on many projects until he resigned in 2013 to become head of the Calgary Public Library. He died in 2019, after a battle with cancer. He was 69.

Another fund-raising project we worked on was publishing the book, *Squak Slough 1870-1920*, by Amy Stickney and Lucile McDonald. Amy was an English teacher at Bothell High in the 1950s and 60s, and she lamented the fact that there was little or no information for the kids to study about our area. She started gathering photos and stories from local old-timers and over time she had enough to make a book. She started working with Sue Kienast, then president of the Bothell Museum, and they enlisted the help of Lucile McDonald, an accomplished local history author. Amy had a thick manuscript which included photos and stories she had gathered from all over the area. Sue realized that the book would need funding and publishing, and so she came to me at the Friends of the Bothell Library in 1975. Sue proposed it as a Bi-Centennial project for the coming year.

It was a worthy project, and the Friends Board immediately signed on. Rita Romig, Rosalie Icenhower, Sue Kienast from the Museum and I, along with two others began work on the book. It was a bigger job than we thought, and we didn't finish it until 1977. I was intimately involved with the assembly of this book, from typing pages (there were no computers in those days), writing captions, titling chapters, cutting the typeset text into the correct sizes for pages, sizing and positioning photos, making the index and so on. A limited number of copies are still for sale at the Bothell Historical Museum.

#### **Bothell Library Historical Facts**

1905: Bothell's first library opened in Odd Fellows Hall.

1905-1918: Several private libraries opened and closed.

1923-1925: Bothell had no formal library but Carlton Ericksen's general merchandise store on Main Street loaned books for pennies a day.

1925: Library opened in a rented room of the American Hotel for \$15 per month before moving to the Bothell Hotel for \$13 per month.

1936: Bothell Town Council approved spending \$10 per month on a librarian's salary, which was split by four volunteer librarians who each worked one week per month.

1946: Bothell contracted with King County Library System (KCLS) for library service.

1969: Opening of an 8,300 square-foot library on 182nd Street, funded by a library bond issue, KCLS, and a Federal Grant.

1986: KCLS annexation voting was approved.

1995: Opening of the current 22,500 square-foot Bothell Regional Library.

It is an honor to write this for the BHSAA newsletter and share my story as a recipient of the 2022 scholarship. At the start of my senior year of high school, I was still deciding whether college was the right fit for me. After not seeing my peers for the year and a half we were quarantined, I discovered a fervent school spirit and started a LatinX Student Union club.

In March of 2022, I applied for the BHSAA scholarship and was invited to an interview. I was nervous at the beginning but quickly fell into conversational ease when asked more about the club and my initial reasons for starting it. My inspiration was my younger brother who had been having difficulty keeping up with elementary schoolwork and learning during COVID-19. I was sure other students were dealing with the same difficulties as my younger brother, and other kids my age who were about to go to college were not informed of resources and opportunities. I wanted to help Spanish-speaking parents aid their children through all levels of education and create a community in my high school for issues relating to our Hispanic communities at schools.

Two months passed and I received confirmation that I had received the scholarship. I had a sense of pride, felt my ideas had been aptly heard, and there was a community that believed in and wanted to see me develop them through my studies. It helped confirm my decision to attend Cascadia Community College to study Political Science.

Upon graduation from Bothell High School, I was given the opportunity to work in the Utility District as a seasonal aide and now an administrative assistant. The scholarship helped me cover costs in the first quarter and I was able to focus on the beginning of my career and settle into the pace of college. I was given a bolstered sense of confidence to continue because someone had seen the value in what I had done and had hope and confidence in what I could do. As I learned more about myself and my goals for the future I decided upon a major change and am now studying Computer and Electrical Engineering.

It was a privilege to visit the Annual Alumni Picnic of 2022 and meet the board members who gave me this opportunity and introduced me to so many more. Seeing BHS students from graduating classes from the '60s, '70s, and '80s and witnessing so many wonderful people gathering to commemorate their high school experience was splendid.

# All Things Sports!

Craig Smith Class of 1963

Bothell grad Zach LaVine is in his seventh NBA season with the Chicago Bulls. LaVine is a star guard for the Bulls. He also is one of two BHS graduates with an Olympic gold medal. He earned it as a member of the 2020 U.S. men's basketball team. LaVine is playing on a five-year, \$215 million contract. He is a two-time winner of the NBA's Slam Dunk contest and a two-time NBA all-star. He began his NBA career in 2014 with Minnesota after one year at UCLA. He has averaged 20.5 points in the NBA. The only other BHS grad with a gold medal is synchronized swimmer Tracie Ruiz, who took home two gold from the 1984 Olympics, one in solo and the other in duet with Candie Costie, an Inglemoor grad.

The BHS football team lost its final four games this fall to finish 5-5 overall and 3-3 in the KingCo 4A competition.

Are you ready for some girls' football? Bothell High will field a girl's flag-football team this winter using a grant from the Seattle Seahawks that also funds the sport in the other three Northshore traditional high schools. During games each team will have seven players on the field.

Bothell High has a new athletic director following the retirement of Yonni Mills, who held the position for 19 years. Rich Klee, whose coaching experience includes a stint as BHS head girls' basketball coach, is the new AD. He is a graduate of Curtis High School outside Tacoma and the University of Washington.

The Bothell cheer squad won its division of "Game Day – Fight Song Cheer" competition in national competition in Anaheim, California, in February.

A Bothell grad holds a Super Bowl record. In the 2019 Super Bowl, Johnny Hekker booted a record 65-yard punt as a Los Angeles Ram in a 13-3 loss to New England. The punt was not returned. Hekker is a 2008 BHS grad who was the Cougar quarterback and punter. He led BHS to the state championship game his senior season where they were defeated by Lewis & Clark of Spokane 21-14. After high school, Hekker punted at Oregon State then signed with the St. Louis Rams, who later moved to Los Angeles. Hekker won a Super Bowl ring as a Ram in 2021. Later, he was released in a cost-cutting move and has punted the past two seasons for the Carolina Panthers. In August of 2023, Johnny was inducted onto the Northshore Wall of Honor at Pop Keeney Stadium.

The BHS girls' basketball team made it to the 4A state tournament last season where they were eliminated by Kamiakin of Kennewick. McKylee Hawkins, a junior, made KingCo first team and coach Leon Johnson was named one of three KingCo 4A coaches of the year after the 20-7 season in which the Cougars finished second in the Crown Division. The state-tournament appearance was the first for Bothell girls since 2016 when the Cougars placed fifth.

Seattle University junior guard Cameron Tyson, a 2018 BHS grad who is the Cougars' all-time scoring leader (he played varsity four years), is back for his senior season at Seattle University. Tyson had declared for the NBA draft then withdrew from it. He is a pre-season All Western Athletic Conference selection after averaging 18.6 points last season. Before playing for Seattle U., Tyson played for Idaho and Houston.

If KingCo standings in various sports, look different it is because the league has expanded with six new members from the Renton/Sea-Tac/White Center area. None of the newcomers is 4A, which is the largest classification and the one in which the Cougars compete. The 3A newcomer is Hazen of the Renton School District and 2A newcomers are Highline, Renton, Foster, Evergreen and Tyee. Foster was a charter member of the KingCo Conference when it was formed in 1952 along with Bothell, Bellevue, Mount Si, Issaquah, and Lake Washington.

One often overlooked athletic achievement by a Bothell grad was Amy Lia '03 winning the 2006 NCAA 1,500-meter champion-ship as a Washington Husky. She became the first UW woman to win an NCAA title in a track event. Her time was 4:14.63. Only one other UW woman has won an NCAA track title since Lia's triumph.

One of the stories the late Al Haynes, a Bothell 1963 grad who became BHS principal and the grandson of Pop Keeney, talked about his grandfather was about the time a football player lost a shoe in the mud of the Bothell field. In the 1920s, the Bothell field, now with artificial turf and named after Keeney, could become a mudhole. After one game, Keeney noticed that one of his players was walking to the locker room with only one shoe on and asked why. "My other shoe came off in the mud during the game and I couldn't find it," the player explained. "I was afraid that if I told you about it that you would take me out of the game."

The Bothell-Inglemoor football rivalry, which Bothell had dominated since the turn of the century, is on hold. Last year Inglemoor began playing an independent schedule rather than competing in the tough KingCo 4A division. Inglemoor is the Northshore School District site of the brainy International Baccalaureate program with 250 IB enrollees in the student body along with standard-curriculum students. There are 250 IB students and it's a safe bet that a low percentage of the IB boys are interested in playing football.


