Recollections of a BHS Centenarian

Edith Andersen Gossan, BHS class of 1939, was born November 12, 1920, to Christian and Elise Marie Nielsen Andersen in Manson Iowa. Yes, that is right, she is 102 and one of our oldest Association members. By no means "old," this lady is a true delight and with a twinkle in her eye, she tells me her story. She is the youngest of four, Helen Andersen McMahon, '36 (dec.); Edwin, '38, and Harold '43; all graduating from BHS. She arrived here on a train with her family at the age of three. They were relocating due to her father's health. Edith remembers the train ride; she had a coloring book and crayons that kept her busy through it all. Soon after arriving here, her father found their property and built their first home. It was just past the Hollywood Poultry Farm on Hollywood Hills. The house, barn, and outbuildings are still standing today. The property remained in the family until 2020, when it was sold after Helen Andersen McMahon and then her son Jeff, passed away.

Edith went to Bothell for all her schooling, catching a school bus with friends. One of her childhood friends Marietta Vaughn '39 and she would save milk tops and after ten, they could go to the Bothell Theatre on main street for a movie. The theatre was across from Bothell's infamous "Largest Christmas Tree." Almost 50 years later she was in Macy's in Palm Springs when she caught the eye of a lady shopping - Marietta. She said they just ran to each other in such surprise. Again, we find it is "a small world after all."

In school she met a young girl who was only there for a brief time but had an enormous impact on Edith. She helped get her into trouble in school for the first time, sending her to the principal. The two girls had to wait about an hour for their bus to come so to pass the time the girl thought it would be funny to ring the fire bell and then run. The girl had it planned that Edith would ring the bell and then her and off they would run. Well, Edith did ring the bell and while she was waiting for the girl to ring it also, she got caught and the girl had run away. Edith never gave her up.

In pure delight she talked about another incident that it sounded like she enjoyed. The school was the old white school which was perched on a steep hill with 50 steps or more leading down the hill (I remember it well) where across the street they were building a new Junior High. The school was a big building built on a small piece of land, hardly enough for a playground and no grass. As the Junior High was being built, she and friends were in awe of all the beautiful green grass. One day she and some others just could not resist the idea of enjoying it. Off they went down the long steps to sit and enjoy the green grass. Unfortunately, school staff were watching out the school windows; yep, caught again.

Edith also recalls that one day some kids were playing baseball and a ball got away and hit her. Big sister Helen came running and screaming, "You've killed my sister, you've killed her!" as she laid there on the ground.

She, friends, and siblings would often go down to the bottom of the hill where the river was and swim or play there. One day along the overgrown banks, sister Helen got into a patch of poison ivy, because she had been told it can kill you, probably a warning to keep them away from it, everyone panicked and ran to get Helen home because she told them she "wanted to die at home."

While in school, she remembers selling candy bars at the sports events and how she dreaded them playing Odea High School because the boys would grab a candy bar and then run away without paying.

Edith loved to roller skate. After high school she ventured closer to Seattle and her first job was at the Triple XXX, a new drive-up restaurant on Roosevelt Way where she delivered orders on skates. She also worked at Sears wearing those skates. She filled orders for nylons in the shipping department. She then tried out at the Palomar Theatre; she remembers well the man who interviewed her. He made her parade back and forth on the stage in front of him for what seemed like hours. She turned that job down. Thank goodness times are changing, and the hiring criteria is not as based on what you look like. I did say *changing*. When the Varsity Theatre opened in the University District, she applied there and became a cashier.

Their ticket booth was outside. She remembers her first glimpses of her husband to be. He worked just down the street at Wiseman's Café, open 24 hrs. Their first date was a blind date set up by a coworker of his. They went to the Coon Chicken Inn where the entrance door was an open mouth.

She and Arthur married in 1942 and raised three children in the Seattle-Shoreline area; Janet, born in 1945, Patrick in 1948, and Lisa, born in 1958. Art had bought Wiseman's Restaurant and then in 1943 he and two or three fraternity brothers decided to form a construction company, C & R Builders. In the early years Edith did the bookkeeping.

Edith loved to cook, sew, garden, was a Brownie, Girl Scout and Bluebird leader, PTA Secretary, Sunday School treasurer, and church secretary, while always taking care of her children, even today, as her daughter Janet told me.

Art retired in 1970 and with Edith they wintered in Palm Springs and summered in Kenmore. During this time Art built two Dairy Queens, which she still owns. They enjoyed their family, golf, and traveling. Art and Edith had 63 years together until Art's passing in 2005. She continued to live in Kenmore until she had a bad fall at one hundred years old. She fractured her vertebrae, broke ribs, and pelvic bones, but powered through physical therapy. What a lady.

How did she spend her 100th? It was during Covid so only immediate family could be there. She stood up, turned and asked Alexa to play her a birthday song. As she did, Edith threw her arms up and out and hollered, "I AM 100 YEARS OLD." Congratulations Edith, now you are 102 strong!

Thank you for sharing a bit of your life with us "youngsters."

From those interviews, the winning students will be selected.

These students spent two important, irreplaceable educational years dealing with the pandemic. Their lives were thrown a curve, and they had to adapt to a new world. Others managed to keep a sense of normalcy by being a part of band, cheer, sports, acting, or getting involved with their religious or community groups. Bothell High To Perform Shakespeare's Twelfth Night

For their Winter play, students at BHS will be performing William Shakespeare's *Twelfth Night* at the Northshore Performing Arts Center on January 13, 14, 19, 20, and 21st. The play is a romantic comedy about mistaken identity that centers on the characters of Viola and Sebastian who are twins that get separated in a shipwreck. Viola makes her way to shore in Illyria, disguises herself as a man, and goes to work for Duke Orsino, who is in love with Countess Olivia. Upon meeting Viola, the Countess falls in love with her thinking she is a man, and Viola in turn falls in love with the Duke. It is believed that the play was written to be performed on the twelfth night after Christmas Day, also called the Eve of the Feast of Epiphany or the Feast of Fools. In Elizabethan times, these feast days were occasions for carnival-like celebrations when servants often dressed up like their masters, and men dressed up as women providing the inspiration for Shakespeare's gender-confused plot.

Shakespeare may seem like challenging material for high school students to take on, but Drama Director Chaya Glass said that many of the themes in Shakespeare's plays are still relevant today, and sometimes they will modernize the production by changing the setting to a different time or place, and that can make the material more relatable for students. For example, in 2016 they performed the play *Much Ado About Nothing* as a Western, and the upcoming performance of *Twelfth Night* will be set in Atlantic City in the 1930's. Changing the setting can also make it easier to source the costumes and design the scenery. Although they have performed a mixture of plays in the nine years she has been at Bothell High, Ms. Glass tries to give students an opportunity to work on a Shakespearean or Greek classical play at least once during their four years at Bothell High.

In addition to the Winter play, the Drama Department also puts on a festival of student-directed one act plays in the Fall, and a musical in the Spring that is produced in collaboration with the Music Department. There is also an improvisation team of students called The Mighty Imps.

These activities provide students with plenty of different opportunities to exercise their creativity whether onstage or behind the scenes; and it also gives them a sense of community. Through their participation in drama, students can build their self-confidence, learn how to problem solve and collaborate, and they are rewarded with a sense of pride in their production. Some students even go on to pursue a career in theater like Patricia Hodges, who graduated from Bothell High in 1966. She has appeared in many TV series such as *Law and Order* and *Royal Pains*, and in numerous plays both on and off-Broadway.

If you haven't attended a Bothell High School stage performance since you graduated, consider seeing *Twelfth Night* in January with the following BHS thespians as cast members:

Bothell High School's 2022 Football season

The varsity football season ended with a rare losing season for the BHS team. It finished this year with a 4-6 record.

Former BHS athletes continue to make impressive accomplishments...

- Johnny Hekker, the NFL punter who won a Super Bowl ring as a Los Angeles Ram last season, now plays for the Carolina Panthers. The Rams released him in move to reduce salaries in the offseason. Hekker, BHS class of 2008, played at Oregon State. He set a Super Bowl record with a 65-yard punt (no return) in a Rams' loss to New England that capped the 2018 season
- Bothell graduate Zach LaVine (Class of 2013), who was on the Gold Medal winning Olympic Games basketball team in 2021, underwent off-season knee surgery and has signed a new five-year contract worth a reported \$215 million with the Chicago Bulls. LaVine is a two-time NBA all-star and a two-time champion of the Slam Dunk Contest. He has averaged more than twenty points a game in his past four NBA seasons. He was a first-round draft choice of the Minnesota Timberwolves after spending one year at UCLA.
- Keep an eye on Cameron Tyson, a 2018 Bothell graduate, when he plays for Seattle University this basketball season. Tyson, Bothell's all-time leading scorer (BHS had transitioned to four-year high school and he was on varsity four years), averaged 14.7 points for SU, as the team was regular-season co-champion of the Western Athletic Conference last year. Tyson played the previous season at Houston where he transferred after playing at Idaho.
- Another major accomplishment by a Bothell athlete was Amy Lia winning the NCAA 1,500-meter championship as a Washington Husky sophomore in 2006. Her time was 4 minutes, 14.63 seconds.

KingCo Turns 70

The KingCo League was formed in 1952 and the charter members were Bothell, Bellevue, Foster, Issaquah, Lake Washington, and Mount Si. This year, it has expanded with six new members from the Renton/Sea-Tac area. None of the newcomers are 4A, the largest classification, and the one in which the Cougars compete. The 3A newcomer is Hazen of the Renton School District and 2A newcomers are Highline, Renton, Foster, Evergreen, and Tyee.

In 1967, she was named the women's editor, later becoming the news editor. After teaching in the Seattle School District, she was named NSD's first communications director in 1979. She's been active in the Woodinville Chamber, the Northshore Schools Foundations, the Northshore Scholarship Foundation, and the Northshore Wall of Honor Committee. She helped form the Bothell and Woodinville historical societies and was a volunteer for the Kenmore Historical Society. McMenamins Anderson School named a room after her in recognition of her service to the community.

Bothell High School's Newest Principal, Juan Price

Much has changed since Bothell High School's first class graduated in 1912. Professor Henry Simonds, Bothell's first principal, moved his family from the Midwest to Bothell in the early 1900's. He convinced the community to provide high school classes so students didn't have to travel to Broadway High School in Seattle to complete their education. Principal Simonds' daughter Sarah was one of the first five BHS Alumni. Today, Bothell is one of four high schools in the Northshore School District, and there are more than 1,800 students in grades nine through 12.

In August 2018, Juan Price accepted the position of principal after Bob Steward announced his retirement. Mr. Price served as Bothell's assistant principal since 2017, so he began his tenure familiar with the community and a with connection to the students and staff. Mr. Price said he was drawn to Bothell and the Northshore School district for its great traditions and family friendly en-

vironment. He and his family feel they've been welcomed into the community, not only as a principal, but as a parent as well.

Born in Brooklyn, New York, Mr. Price earned his bachelor's degree in history from Eckerd College in 1997 and his master's in teaching at Saint Martin's University in 2000. Working as a camp counselor while attending Eckerd showed him how much he enjoyed working with young adults and pointed him into the education field. When asked what prompted the move from the east to the west coast, Mr. Price responded by saying he had family in the Lacey area that offered him a free place to stay while he was attending school. Otherwise, we'd have lost him to sunny California and the University of San Diego. Mr. Price taught AP U.S. Government and Politics, and U.S. History for twelve years and received his K-12 Principal Certification from the University of Washington in 2009. He was assistant principal at Roosevelt High School from 2012 to 2017, while also serving as cochair of the AP Government & Politics Curriculum Development & Design Committee College Board from 2009 to 2016.

He says the easiest, and most enjoyable part of this job is sitting down and talking to students and teachers one on one as that's where he learns the most. He takes immense pride watching students grow from freshman to seniors, both academically, and personally. I asked Mr. Price what piece of advice he gives students that he wished he'd received in high school. He said, "The world can be a tough place if you are not prepared to deal with the obstacles that will be thrown in your way. Take advantage of the opportunities you get while in high school."
